Promoting British Values at St Paul's Church of England Primary School

The Department of Education states that there is a need to 'create and enforce a clear and rigorous expectation on all schools to promote fundamental British values.

At ST Paul's Church of England Primary School we are dedicated to promoting values which ensure our pupils develop a strong sense of social and moral responsibility, and which prepare the young people at the school for life in modern Britain. Values such as individual liberty, democracy, the rule of law, mutual respect and tolerance of those with different faiths and beliefs are embedded in the school's ethos, but are also promoted in a variety of ways throughout the school year.

What it means to be British at St Paul's Church of England Primary school

As a school we value and celebrate the diverse heritage of everyone at St Paul's. Alongside this we value and celebrate being part of Great Britain. This means that we celebrate traditions and customs over the course of the year such as Harvest festival, Remembrance Day, Easter and a trip to the pantomime at Christmas time. Through assemblies we celebrate Saint days such as 'St George's day'. We also provide opportunities for children to sample themed lunches such as 'Lancashire day', Bonfire lunch and 'Teddy Bears picnic'. In the past we also celebrated the Queen's Jubilee through holding a Street Party which was organised by the PTA. Furthermore children learn about being part of Great Britain through our creative curriculum topic that link to British History

Members of the school leadership group elected by class votes/ballot.

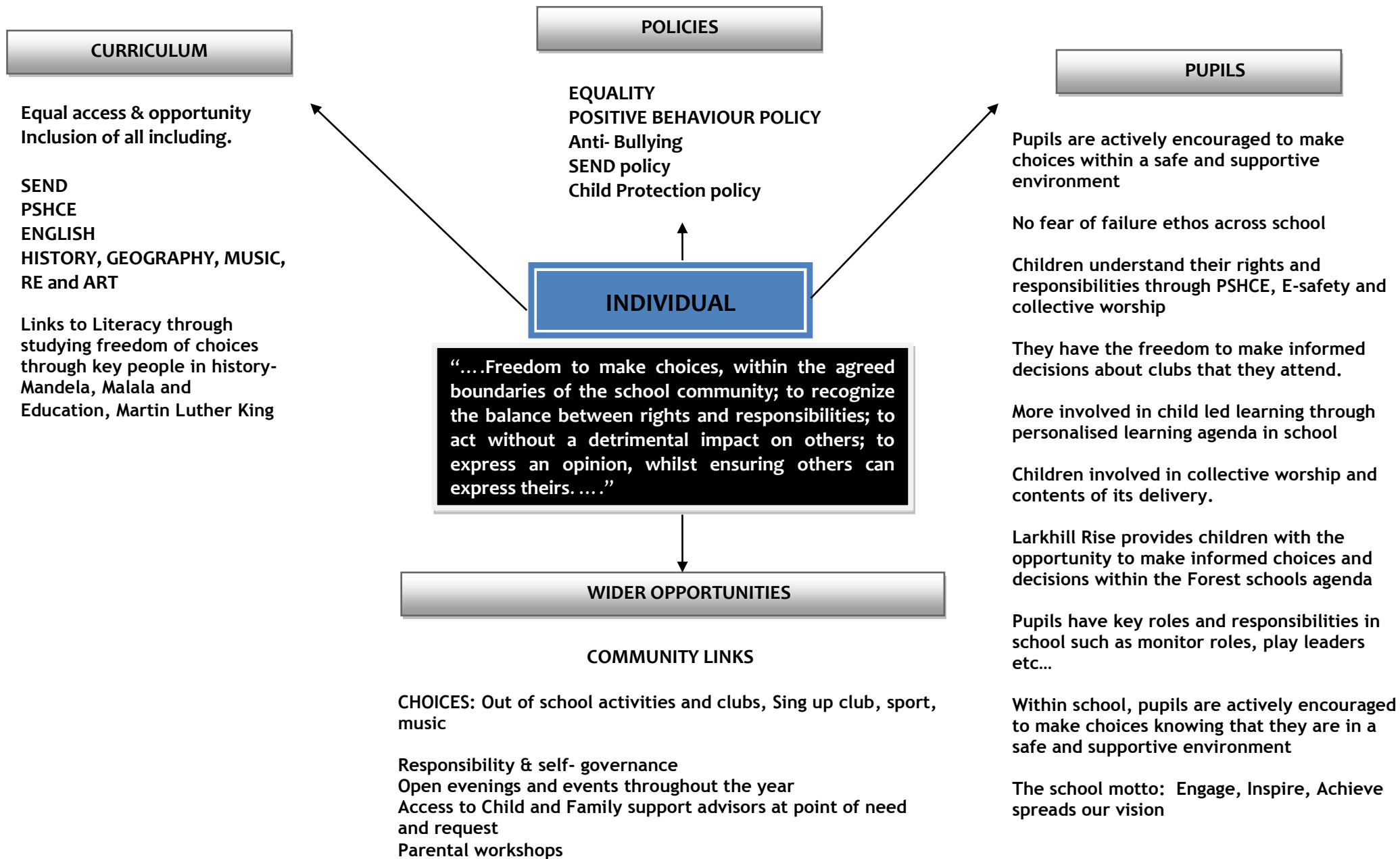
