NASA's Perseverance rover

Mission Name: Mars 2020

Rover Name: Perseverance

Main Job: The Perseverance rover will seek signs of ancient life and collect rock and soil samples for possible return to Earth.

Launch: 30th July 2020, Cape Canaveral Air Force Station, Florida, USA

Landed: 18th February 2021

Landing Site: Jezero Crater, Mars

Mission Duration: At least one Mars year (about 687 Earth days)

How does the rover search for signs of past life?

The rover's landing site, Jezero Crater, is a 49km (30 mile) depression. More than 3.5 billion years ago, scientists think, river channels spilled over the wall of Jezero to form a lake. It is in this area, that scientists believe they may find signs of past life.

Why does Perseverance have so many cameras?

Perseverance has 23 cameras, more than any other interplanetary mission in history. They helped engineers put together a high-definition view of the landing process. They continue to deliver images of the landscape in great detail.
