Maths


Continue with classroom secrets; You will find a lesson for each day. Watch the video and then complete the activities -

Science

Two more activities have been set on purple mash for our new topic of light.

Explore shadows and answer the questions -
What are shadows? Where are shadows?

Go on a Shadow Hunt'- record different shadows - different shapes, sizes, and the darkness of the shadows. How many different shadows can you find?

If available compare the darkness of shadows through different numbers of layers of greaseproof paper.?

Can you make your own shadows using torches?
What happens if you move the torch closer or further away?
