#### Winter weather




#### It's that time of year...

As part of our winter preparation, I would like to inform you that we take Health and Safety very seriously in school and in the unfortunate event of extreme weather we will aim to remain open.

### Winter virus information



We currently have a high number of pupils and staff who have been off sick with suspected flu-like symptoms. Symptoms of influenza (flu) can include fever, an aching body, dry cough, headache, sore throat, diarrhoea or tummy pain, feeling sick and being sick. Despite school being cleaned daily using antibacterial solutions with the use of antibacterial soap and hand gels available for all to use freely. It is that time of year and many schools and people across the valley are suffering with the virus.

## Apply for support for with childcare costs.



From 2 January 2024, eligible working parents can apply for 15 hours of childcare for their two-year-old. Parents have until 31 March 2024 to apply for a code, with mid-January to the end of February being the optimum time to apply in case they need to provide further information to support their application.

To apply for a childcare code each parent needs to be working and earning the equivalent of 16 hours a week at national minimum/living wage and under £100,000 adjusted net income per year. This means that each parent needs to earn from just over £8,600 per year to be eligible for 15 hours a week of childcare during term time.

There is more information on the childcare support available to parents on the <u>Childcare Choices</u> website, where they can explore the early education entitlements and other government help with childcare costs.


Registering for the Free School Meal service also means the school will receive additional funding for your child, which is called Pupil Premium.

Please note that younger siblings of pupils who are already entitled will not automatically qualify for Free School Meals. If a family's circumstances have changed and cease to be entitled to qualifying benefits, the elder children will be protected but any new children will not qualify. This is why Pupil Access Team require applications completing so they can properly assess new sibling's entitlement.

#### February Disco Thursday 8<sup>th</sup> February 2024

Dear parents / carers

The 2024 February Disco is held at school on **Thursday 8**<sup>th</sup> **February.** 

The doors open for all children at **6.00pm** and **ALL** children need to be collected from school **by 8.00pm** by a responsible adult.

Please note that only children that currently attend St. Paul's are allowed in the Disco. We realise this may cause inconvenience for some parents with younger children, however it is a rule for the safety of our children.

The price is £2 per child. If you wish to stay with your child at the Disco, then the cost per adult is £2.00. Please note that adults do not need to stay as the children will be supervised by staff and PTA volunteers. Adults who stay cannot use their mobile phones during the disco. This is a strict rule for safeguarding reasons. We will have to ask you to leave if this rule is ignored.

A list of volunteers will be made prior to the disco and volunteers should arrive at 5.45pm and entrance is free. Please leave your name at the school reception or contact the PTA through the Facebook page. We will not be accepting volunteers on the night.

As well as the Disco, where the children can boogie in their best dresses or party pants, there are other activities such as lucky dip, crafts and games. Refreshments in the form of hot dogs are available to buy plus juice, water, crisps and sweets. Face painting and temporary tattoos are also available on the night. Please note the tattoos are easily removed with baby oil. Prices range from 20p to £1.00, and all stall holders are happy to help children who are not confident with money.

The children have a wonderful time and grow in confidence with each school Disco, however if you have any concerns please seek out a member of the PTA or ask at reception.

No mobile phones or any electronic recording devices are allowed at the disco (children or adults) for the safety of all the children.

## This week we have been learning...



**Amazing Acorns** 



The children have been fantastic as always this week.

In English we have been exploring and learning a winter poem. The children had to perform it. We have also started to write our setting description.

Another lovely week in Berries. In English we have been continuing our story Handa's surprise. The children enjoyed telling me their favourite part of the text. In maths the year 1 children have been filling in missing numbers on a number line. The reception children have been counting to 20 and partitioning numbers. In geography, we have been looking at human features. We explored our playground and pictures of our town to see what we could find. We loved using the trikes in our gross motor challenge.

#### Awesome Ashes



This week in English we have been planning out our setting description for our final writing piece. In science we have started to look at humans as animals and we explored our facial features and the different parts of our body. Thank you for those who sent in their family pictures, the children really enjoyed comparing and looking at the difference of lots of different people.

#### **Super Sycamores**



This week in Sycamores **English** we have been innovating our own stories based upon 'The Bear and the Piano'. The children thought of lots of interesting ideas including 'The bunny and the skateboard', 'The snake and the ballet shoes'!


In **Maths** this week, we have been working hard on recognising and describing the properties of 2 and 3D shapes. Our topic this week is **RE**. We have been learning about the religion of Judaism. We thought about promises we have made to others and the Jewish stories of God's promise to his people (including Noah and the ark). We looked carefully at a Torah scroll and made our own! We also made our own Sukkah's in Forest School (to represent the Jewish festival of Sukkot where Jewish people remember God's promise to his people).

#### **Outstanding Alders**



We have had a great week in Alders this week. In English we have planed and started writing our letter to Bertha, Arthur's niece. I am really looking forward to reading them. In math's we have been adding and subtracting with exchange and have enjoyed using the base tens and ones to help us. In history we have continued our work on World War 1 and the Accrington Pals and are enjoyed finding out lots of facts about the war. In PE we have enjoyed playing team games and working together.

#### **Enchanted Elms**



This week in English we have been learning about Mount Vesuvius and how it erupted in Pompeii. We have been thinking about how the citizens would have felt. The children watched an enactment of Mount Vesuvius erupting. They have thought about their senses and imaging what they could see, hear,

smell and touch when this was happening. In Science we have continued to look at magnets - Seeing what is magnetic around school and why certain metals are magnetic and some aren't. In Art we have continued to make mosaic designs and learn about symmetry. In Maths we have been learning mental addition compensation e.g. 49 + 54 - rounding 49 to 50 and then subtracting one.

#### Marvellous Maples



Last Friday, Maples enjoyed exploring Forest school in the snow. We worked in groups to paint the snow using our skills from Art lessons. The ideas were great including rainbows and butterfly's to a scene of the London skyline.

In Maths this week, we have been learning to tell the time; analogue, digital and twenty-four hour. To support your child with these concepts please can you practice telling the time at home, especially analogue. In English, we have started to write our innovative story based on the Boy Who Grew Dragons and I am looking forward to continuing to write these next week. In History we continue our learning about Black History and how significant the cotton industry was in Lancashire, by looking at maps to discover the number of mills and houses, as well as learning about Henry Ashworth.

#### **Dazzling Elders**



Elders have been learning about danger, risk and hazard in PSHE and how we can distinguish between them. The children have also been thinking about the Anglo Saxons and what we already know and what we would like to find out. During Art, the children have been looking at Anglo Saxon crosses and have started to draw the intricate patterns they have really paid attention to the detail. In maths, the Y4 children have been using decimal notation and have becoming very knowledgeable about tenths and hundredths. The Y4's are currently practising the 7 times tables. The year 5's have been multiplying and dividing. The children have been learning about teeth in Science and have planned an investigation to find out how different liquids affect our teeth.

#### Wonderful Willows



It has been another busy week in Willows. The children have been working super hard in English. We have been researching what life was like in a Victorian Workhouse in preparation for writing our non-chronological reports. We have continued reading the novel Streetchild where our protagonist Jim has finally managed to escape the workhouse but now has to negotiate life on the streets.

In Guided Reading we used graphs to show how tension built up in the chapter which explained his escape.

We also had a super history lesson this week where we used drama techniques to look at child labour in Victorian factories and mills. The children did amazingly, getting into character and using their knowledge to roleplay and hot seat. We also looked at the reliability of different sources and how bias must be considered when using them to draw conclusions. Just a reminder for Year 6 to return any outstanding Robinwood letters as soon as possible.

Our next Forest School session is next Thursday - 1st February.

#### Mighty Oaks



The weeks seems to be going at a rate of knots since our return from Christmas as does the learning in Oaks class. In maths, we have come to the end of our topic in geometry, working out missing angles, classifying geometric shapes and finding the area of triangles using a formula. We are now looking at place value, with an emphasis on negative numbers. We have been continuing our work using our class novel and in English, the children have been looking at using formality when writing. They are now busy planning their own non-chronological report using some very strange and unusual creatures! Mexico has been our focus in geography, using Google Earth and satellite images to map different locations and make comparisons. Thank you for the forms returned already for Robinwood pick up/medication. If these have not been returned, please can they be in school before the half term holiday.

 PE this term will be each Tuesday (outdoor) and Friday (indoor). Please make sure kits are in school for each of the sessions.

## **Budding Blossoms**

















